

What is Pet Peace of Mind?

Pet Peace of Mind® allows hospice patients to complete their end-of-life journey with the comfort and companionship of a pet, without having to worry about their pet's current or future needs.

How *Pet Peace of Mind®* assists patients' pets:

- Basic in-home pet care (one to two times per week: dog walking, dog waste clean-up, litter box changing, feeding pets, etc.)
- · Deliver pet food
- One-time funding for a routine veterinary visit including vaccinations (additional veterinary care provided on an emergency basis)
- Funding for six months of flea/tick or heartworm medications (to be used only under veterinary supervision)
- Funding for grooming services when medically necessary
- Foster care or placement of the pet when the patient dies

As pet lovers, we know that our pets understand when something is wrong, or can sense when we are not feeling well. They comfort us, they ease our tension, they reduce our fear, and they love us no matter what.
