- Prepare a plan to manage the expectations of the family and staff on a patient suffering from a chronic wound
- Differentiate between acute and chronic wounds

At the conclusion of this presentation the participant will be able to:

- Describe key changes in elderly skin that result in significant increase in risk for skin injury
- Identify risk factors that increase an individual's likelihood of developing skin tears
- Discuss individualizing skin tear prevention strategies
- Assess and classify skin tears using the ISTAP Skin Care Classification tool
- Discuss recommended treatment options for skin tears

At the conclusion of this presentation the participant will be able to:

- Describe how infection is spread including causes, symptoms and route through which infection can be spread
- Explain why it is important to prevent infection and measures that can be taken to contain infections and minimize its spread
- Define types of precautions to prevent spread of infection and give examples
- Identify barriers and personal protective equipment (PPE) for protection from exposure to potentially infectious material
